AWARDS OF THE ASSOCIATION

John W. Blassingame Award. Awarded every third year to honor distinguished scholarship and/or mentorship in African American history.

John Hope Franklin Lifetime Achievement Award. Awarded every four years to recognize an individual who has had a distinguished career in southern history, who has contributed significantly to scholarship in the field, and who has exhibited outstanding qualities of citizenship.

Fletcher M. Green and Charles W. Ramsdell Award. Awarded in even-numbered years for the best article published in the Journal of Southern History during the two preceding years.

William F. Holmes Award. Awarded annually for the best paper presented at the annual meeting by a graduate student or junior faculty member.

Jack Temple Kirby Award. For recognition of a journal article on southern agricultural or environmental history. Awarded in odd-numbered years for an article published during the two preceding years.

H. L. Mitchell Award. For recognition of a distinguished book concerning the history of the southern working class, including but not limited to industrial laborers and/or small farmers and agricultural laborers. Awarded in even-numbered years for a book published during the two preceding years.

Frank L. and Harriet C. Owsley Award. For recognition of a distinguished book in southern history published in even-numbered years. Awarded in odd-numbered years.

James A. Rawley Award. For recognition of a distinguished book dealing with secession and/or the sectional crisis. Awarded in odd-numbered years for a book published during the two preceding years.

Francis B. Simkins Award. For recognition of the best first book by an author in the field of southern history over a two-year period. Awarded in odd-numbered years, the award is sponsored jointly with Longwood University.

Charles S. Sydnor Award. For recognition of a distinguished book in southern history published in odd-numbered years. Awarded in even-numbered years.

Bennett H. Wall Award. For recognition of the best book published in southern business or economic history. Awarded in even-numbered years for a book published during the two preceding years.

C. Vann Woodward Dissertation Award. Awarded annually for the best dissertation in southern history completed and defended during the previous calendar year.

SHA SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY

The Southern Historical Association opposes sexual harassment in all aspects of academia. Further, the Association encourages informational activities designed to promote the education of its members and the public regarding sexual harassment and to encourage historians to speak out against such incidents. Simultaneously, the Association deplores efforts to limit academic discourse and free speech on campuses, and it disapproves of the violation of academic freedom and the harassment to which some faculty have been subjected. The Association offers the following Code of Ethics for its members and for the consideration of the larger society.

- I. A. Sexual harassment within academe is unethical, unprofessional, and threatening to academic freedom. In the academic context, the term "sexual harassment" may be used to describe a wide range of behaviors. It includes, but is not limited to, the following: sexist remarks or behavior, whether in or out of the classroom; requests for sexual favors; sexual advances, whether sanction free, linked to reward, or accompanied by threat of retaliation; the use of authority to emphasize the sexuality or sexual identity of a student in a manner that prevents or impairs that student's full enjoyment of educational benefits, climate, or opportunities; and sexual assault. Such behaviors are unacceptable because they are forms of unprofessional conduct that seriously undermine the atmosphere of trust essential to the academic environment.
- B. The potential of sexual harassment is not limited to incidents involving members of the profession and students. Sexual harassment of colleagues and staff also is unethical, as is student harassment of other students.
- C. It is unprofessional behavior to condone sexual harassment or to disregard complaints of sexual harassment from students, staff, or colleagues. Such actions or inactions allow a sexually hostile environment to exist and are inconsistent with the maintenance of academic freedom.
- II. In addition to sexual harassment, amorous relationships that might be appropriate in other circumstances are inappropriate and should be avoided when they occur between members of the profession and any student for whom he or she has a professional responsibility. Implicit in the idea of professionalism is the recognition by those in positions of authority that in their relationships with their students there is always an element of power. It is incumbent upon members of the profession not to abuse, nor seem to abuse the power with which they are entrusted, since relationships between members of the profession and their students are quite imbalanced. Such relationships may have the effect of undermining the atmosphere of trust among students and faculty on which the educational process depends.
- III. The Southern Historical Association encourages chairs of departments of history to pass these guidelines on to the members of their departments. It suggests, moreover, that department chairs and historians urge their respective universities and workplaces to enforce existing federal regulations prohibiting sexual harassment and to publicize grievance procedures available to students, faculty, or staff who have been subjected to sexual harassment.
- If SHA members encounter problems of sexual harassment, they should refer those problems to the American Historical Association's Professional Division, located at 400 A Street, S.E., Washington, D.C. 20003-3889. Telephone: 202-544-2422. As the umbrella organization for the history profession, the AHA's Professional Division has experience in handling sexual harassment complaints. The Division also has legal counsel to guide its work.





This is a drop-in event. For those who would like to view the museum's exhibits with a specialist of the topic or era, the SHA will provide a few "gallery tours" beginning at 7:15 PM, and continuing every 15 minutes until (and including) 9:15 p.m. Space is limited to 20 for each of these tours, and will be offered first-come, first-served. You are welcome to tour the museum on your own as well.

On the seventh floor, a reception and a wine/beer bar will be available throughout the evening. The museum will also be open to all attendees throughout the evening (though you must leave food and drink on the seventh floor). The West End is also home to numerous restaurants, as is the downtown area between the conference hotel and the museum. Attendance at the reception should not conflict with Saturday evening dinner plans.

The Sixth Floor Museum is at 411 Elm Street in Dallas's West End, about a 20 minute walk directly across Commerce Street, or you may take the train from the St. Paul Street Station, located directly behind the Sheraton Hotel. Blue, Green, and Orange west bound lines all go to the West End, and a train leaves about every three minutes. Fare is \$2.50 for a two hour pass, or \$5.00 for an all-day pass, and must be purchased before boarding the train. Efrog shuttles are available throughout downtown and work for tips; attendees may also call a ride-share program or a taxi.

SITES OF INTEREST

The Dallas Sheraton is located in downtown Dallas, within a ten minute walk of both the newly expanded Dallas Arts District to the north and historic Deep Ellum to the east, where Texas blues were born, and which remains one of the best places in town for new music and great tacos. The West End—about a twenty minute walk or five minute train ride—has the Sixth Floor Museum and the Holocaust Museum. Stellar restaurants, craft cocktails, local Tex-Mex diners, and dependable chains are at each of these places and frequently in between.

- **Deep Ellum** (http://www.tinyurl.com/shadeepellum). A historic entertainment district, which is about a ten to fifteen minute walk from the hotel. See a detailed Deep Ellum Crawl listing at the link.
- **Dallas Arts District** (http://www.dallasartsdistrict.org). The largest contiguous urban arts district in the nation.
- **Dallas Museum of Art** (http://www.dma.org). The DMA is FREE except some special exhibits charges, such as the Keir Collection of Islamic Art Gallery (the acquisition of which has made the DMA the third largest repository of Islamic art in the nation).
- **Nasher Sculpture Center** (http://www.nashersculpturecenter.org). One of the foremost sculpture collections in the world.
- **Crow Collection of Asian Art** (http://www.crowcollection.org). An unexpected hidden jewel of a museum.
- Opera enthusiasts may want to purchase tickets to Verdi's "La Traviata" at the **Winspear Opera House** (http://www.dallasopera.org) on November 10 or 12. Both the Dallas Opera and the Winspear are spectacular.
- Fans of dance may want to purchase tickets to Cuba's Malpaso at the **Dallas City Performance Hall** (http://www.attpac.org) on November 10 or 11. Again, both the arts organization, Titas, and the venue are terrific.
- Food truck aficionados will want to stop by **Klyde Warren Park** (http://www.klydewarrenpark.org) which has a wide variety of cuisine between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. each day, and sometimes into the evening. Depending on programing, you can also find a yoga session, samba lessons, or dog shows.
- The **Perot Museum of Nature and Science** (http://www.perotmuseum.org) is amazing. Beyond the Arts District it is about 20 minutes by foot or if you pick up the trolley at Federal and Olive you can take it to the Olive and Colby stop where you will have less than a half mile walk. This museum occasionally sells out though that is unlikely in November. Get tickets online ahead of time.
- Blues fans might also want to walk about ten minutes south from the conference hotel on a pilgrimage to **508 Park** (http://www.508park.org), where Robert Johnson recorded back in 1937. The facility is undergoing restoration, and we hope to arrange a sneak peek (check in at conference registration for more info), but you can always just walk by to pay homage.
